Kore Dumpsite

- We serve people who live in and near Kore or Koshe, which means "dirty" in Amharic. This dumpsite holds the trash of 6 million people living in or near Addis Ababa, the capital of Ethiopia. About 3,500 people work at this dumpsite.
- Ethiopia is one of the poorest countries on earth, with an average annual household income of \$1,020. Healthcare remains a challenge, and in Kore in particular. Cases of leprosy and tuberculosis are present and infectious diseases like measles, malaria, and HIV/AIDS are a significant threat.
- Through a donor-sponsored holistic scholarship program, we're empowering children to change their futures.
